Exercise for searching an online sociology encyclopedia to find overview articles

1. Start at library home page, <http://www.oberlin.edu/library/>
2. Select the Catalog tab to search OBIS
3. Change the drop-down search option to Title; search: blackwell encyclopedia of sociology
4. Connect to the encyclopedia
5. Beneath the search box select Search this book; then type: discrimination, and click Go

Exercise for using SocioSite to explore topics of interest

1. Go to Sociosite, <http://www.sociosite.net>
2. Choose Subject Areas (1st box); explore Poverty

FINDING BOOKS AND OTHER LIBRARY MATERIALS

OBIS is the Oberlin College Library’s online catalog; it lists most library materials. The **OhioLINK Library Catalog** combines the holdings of 90 libraries at colleges and universities—and through SearchOhio, those of an additional 20 public libraries—across Ohio. Both can be searched by **Author** or **Title** for a specific author or work, or by **Subject Heading** or **Keyword** for works about a topic, person, place, etc.

Exercise for searching OBIS for books relevant to your topic

1. Start at library home page, <http://www.oberlin.edu/library/>
2. In the Catalog tab, change the drop-down search option to Subject; search: school violence
3. Click on Limit/Sort Search; for YEAR of publication, in the After box type 2006, and click Search

USING DATABASES TO FIND ARTICLES IN SCHOLARLY JOURNALS

Connect from Databases tab on the Library home page search box, or use the Quick Links drop-down menu

SocINDEX.

A major index for sociology and related disciplines; indexes articles in 2,600+ journals.

Academic Search Complete.

Indexes articles from 13,000+ general and academic periodicals in all disciplines; over 65% of the journals indexed include full text, and most are peer-reviewed.

Exercise for searching SocINDEX for scholarly journal articles relevant to your topic

1. From the library home page, choose the Databases tab
2. Change the “by subject” drop-down search option to Sociology and select SocINDEX
3. In box 1 enter search terms for the first concept, each connected by “or”
4. In box 2 enter search terms for the second concept, each connected by “or,” and click Search
5. Refine results by choosing “Scholarly (Peer Reviewed) Journals”
6. Refine results again by choosing “Publication Date” 2004-2014

☞ To determine if the library has a particular journal, Use “360 Link to Full Text” or “Find It!” when available in research databases, or select the **Journal Finder** tab on Library home page or from the Quick Links pull-down menu

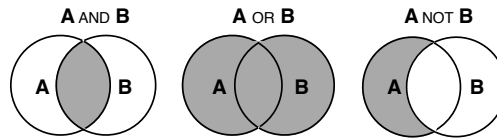

DATABASE SEARCH TIPS

Examples are from *SocINDEX* using EBSCO’s Ebscohost search engine

Concept	Explanation	Example
Phrase search (quotes required)	search for an exact phrase	“death penalty” “standardized test”
Boolean logic (for keyword searching)	use Boolean operators (AND, OR, NOT) for more precise searching	[see examples below]
AND	search for records that include <i>all</i> of the words (narrows the search)	race and poverty
OR	search for records that include <i>any</i> of the words (broadens the search)	homosexual or gay or lesbian or queer
NOT	<i>exclude</i> records that include the word (narrows the search)	advertising not (television or radio)
Truncation	search for root word with any ending	immigra* [finds immigrant, immigrants, immigration, etc.]

Visual representation of how Boolean searching works (Venn diagrams)



SUMMON – default tab on library home page search box

- searches across the spectrum of library content: books, scholarly articles, newspaper articles, magazine articles, data, audio, video, images, government documents, and more
- draws from OBIS, full text databases, and digital repositories from colleges, universities, research centers, and other open-access archives
- direct links to online content (in most cases)

Keep in mind...

- Summon searches many, *but not all*, library resources
- comprehensive or complex searches should be done in subject specific databases
- OBIS and OhioLINK are generally better for finding books

Exercise for searching with Summon for additional publications relevant to your topic

1. From the library home page, make sure the Summon tab is selected
2. In the Search box, type: gay parenting
3. Under Refine Your Search, select “Scholarly and Peer-Review”
4. Add another concept by including the word “attitudes”

HOW TO GET MATERIALS NOT AVAILABLE AT OBERLIN

OhioLINK/SearchOhio

- how it works: 110 Ohio libraries lend materials (primarily books) to each other
 - ☞ *does not include delivery of journal articles – see section below on ILL*
- to request: do-it-yourself online searching and requesting
- Barcode is the number on the back of your OCID
- how long it takes: allow 3-4 business days
- loan period: 3 weeks + up to 6 three-week renewals if item has not been requested by someone else

Interlibrary Loan (ILL or ILLiad)

- use for: articles in journals not available at Oberlin, books not available from OhioLINK
- how it works: libraries lend materials to each other; for journal articles they may send scanned pdfs
- to request: select “ILLiad/Interlibrary Loan” from the Quick Links menu on the Library’s home page; set up an account; enter and track ILL requests online
- how long it takes: allow 1-2 weeks; many articles arrive much more quickly
- loan period: journal articles are yours to keep; loan period for books varies
